



VCE

VCE-VM

The VCE is the Victorian
Certificate of Education.
Successfully completing the
VCE and achieving study scores
in at least 4 subjects (including
an English subject) will give you
an ATAR, which can help you
get into university.

The VCE VM is a 2-year vocational and applied learning program within the VCE with specific subjects designed to prepare students for life, further study and employment.

QUICK EXPLAINER – KEY TERMS

STUDY SCORE


ATAR

A study score is a number between 0 and 50 that indicates your ranking in relation to all other students doing the same subject in that year.

An ATAR is the Australian Tertiary Admission Rank, used by universities to select students for their courses. It's a figure (or ranking) between 0.00 and 99.95.

VCE – VM (VOCATIONAL MAJOR)



WHAT IS VCE-VM (VOCATIONAL MAJOR)?

- The VCE Vocational Major (VCE VM) is a two-year applied learning program that's part of the VCE. At Bass Coast College, VCE-VM is run across Yrs 11 & 12
- Those undertaking this pathway will obtain the skills for work and life.
- They will also receive hands-on experience in one or more industries, finishing school with an employability edge
- VCE VM subjects don't receive a study score
- VCE VM is a great choice if you prefer to learn in a real-world environment and don't need an ATAR for your intended pathway post schooling.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

Given that the program is so popular, there is an application process.

- As a team the <u>Year 10 Coordinators</u>, <u>Campus Principal</u>, and the <u>VCE-VM/VET</u> <u>Coordinator</u> assess applicants' suitability on an individual basis.
- Successful applicants are often confirmed and notified by the end of term 3*

- Year 10 Work Experience participation
- Attendance
- Compass entries (positive (green) and less positive (yellow/red))
- PLRs (behaviour and work ethic)
- Individual career plans
- Year 10 reports



WORK PLACEMENT

What does work placement look like?

- Placement must have a career focus (IT IS DIFFERENT TO YOUR PART-TIME JOB)
- Placement can be at <u>two</u> separate employers
- Formal paperwork must be completed prior to starting your work placement



VOCATIONAL EDUCATION & TRAINING

Completing VET whilst in VCE and VCE-VM

Vocational Education and Training (VET DSS) is an education that prepares students for specific careers within the workplace or supports their transition to vocational and/or higher education.

- It is a learning option that is available to young people in schools in the senior phase of their learning
- It can provide credit towards a nationally recognised VET qualification.

CONSIDERATIONS FOR UNDERTAKING VET?

VCE

- A VET in VCE program can contribute units toward the completion of a full VCE
- A VCE VET can receive a study score
- Competencies gained are transferable to other training institutions
- Going to an external provider will result in missing classes at BCC EVERY WEEK

VET

- Mandatory requirement for VM 180 nominal hours over 2 years
- Suits the Applied Learning approach of VM
- Competencies gained are transferable to other training institutions
- Start building your skillset in your chosen pathway

COURSE COUNSELLING


Key Information:

- You will be required to attend a course counselling interview in the weeks after selections close.
- You will need to bring a printed copy of your subject selections to the interview
- This copy must be signed by a parent / carer
- You will have the opportunity to ask questions and make changes to your subject selections during the interview.
- Parents / carers are welcome to attend the interview

Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR)

A ranking on a scale of 0.00 to 99.95, based on study scores, given to a student. Calculated by VTAC and used by tertiary institutions to select students for their courses.

Department of Education
 The Victorian Government
 department that administers
 government school education,

apprenticeships and traineeships.

General Achievement Test (GAT)

A test completed by all students enrolled in one or more VCE or scored VCE VET Unit 3 and 4 subject sequence. Section A of the GAT is completed by students enrolled in one or more VCE VM Unit 3 and 4 subject sequence.

Outcomes

What students are expected to know and have achieved by the time they have finished a VCE unit.

Registered training organisation (RTO)

An organisation approved by the Victorian Registration and Qualifications Authority or the Australian Skills Quality Authority to deliver and issue VET qualifications.

Satisfactory (S)

Certifies that a student has successfully completed the outcomes of a unit in VCE, VCE VM, or VPC, or units of competency for VCE VET.

School-assessed coursework (SAC)

Used to assess a student's level of achievement. Tasks are selected by the school from the designated study design.

School-assessed task (SAT)

Used to assess students' specific sets of practical skills and knowledge.

Tasks are set by the VCAA and assessed by the teacher.

School-based apprenticeship or traineeship (SBAT)

An apprenticeship or traineeship undertaken in the VCE, VCE VM or VPC, with at least one day a week spent on the job or in training during the

normal school week.

Semester

Half the academic year (around 20 weeks across 2 consecutive school terms). Most units last for one semester. In the VCE, Unit 3 is completed in the first semester and Unit 4 is completed in the second semester. This can be more flexible in the VCE VM.

Statement of Attainment

A record of recognised learning that may contribute towards a VET qualification.

Statement of Results

A set of documents that lists a student's VCE, VCE VM or VPC results, and if the relevant certificate has been awarded.

Student Achievement Profile

A holistic summary of a student's achievements captured during their senior secondary education that will complement the existing Statement of Results.

Structured Workplace Learning (SWL)

On-the-job training that allows VET students to develop their work skills and understand employer expectations.

Subjects

The studies available in the VCE, VCE VM and VPC.

Study score

A score between 0 and 50, showing how a student performed in a VCE Unit 3–4 sequence or scored VCE VET program, relative to all other students. This is calculated using the scores achieved in each of the graded assessments for the subject, 2 for VCE VET and 3 for VCE.

TAFE

TAFEs offer a range of VET courses up to the level of Advanced Diploma.

Units (VCE, VCE VM or VPC)

The parts of a subject in the VCE, VCE VM or VPC. There are usually 4 units in a subject.

Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE)

The senior secondary qualification in Victoria.

Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority (VCAA)

The statutory authority responsible for providing curriculum and assessment programs for students in Victoria.

Victorian Pathways Certificate (VPC)

A foundation secondary qualification designed for students who would benefit from an individualised program at a more accessible level than a senior secondary certificate.

- Victorian Registration and Qualifications Authority (VRQA) Victoria's education and training regulator.
- Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre (VTAC) Calculates and distributes the ATAR and processes tertiary entrance applications.

VCE Vocational Major (VCE VM)
A 2-year vocational and applied
learning program within the VCE,
with specific subjects designed to
prepare students for a vocational
pathway.
